

Keeping Your Horses & Livestock Safe

→ Dividers and gates must be secured properly and not swing about during travel to ensure your horses & livestock's safety. Look for solid construction, no protruding parts, no rattling and solid construction when buying a new trailer.







→ When loading horses or livestock, make sure the doors are opened fully and fastened against the side of the trailer using the door holdbacks.

- → Use tie rings as they are intended to secure your horses during travel. Inspect for cracks on tie rings periodically. A rule of thumb is to leave about 18 inches of free rope between the attachment point on the trailer and the horse.
- → Remove or secure anything that is possibly loose that could move about and startle or injure your horses, including handles, butt bars, unused stall dividers, saddles and tack.






→ Open and adjust roof vents and windows to allow for maximum ventilation and light into the trailer to keep your horses calm, cool and comfortable. Ventilation is recommended even in cold weather.



→ Make sure there are no protruding objects that could harm your animals.



- Secure tack properly in your trailer to eliminate damage to your tack room and other equipment.
- → Stop within the first 15-30 minutes of your trip to make sure your horses, livestock and other equipment are secure.
- → On long trips, it's recommended horses be removed from the trailer every 6-10 hours for exercise, watering and food.
